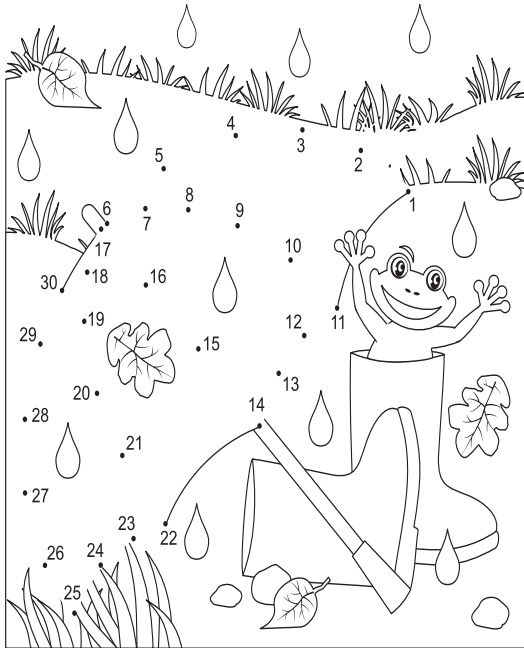

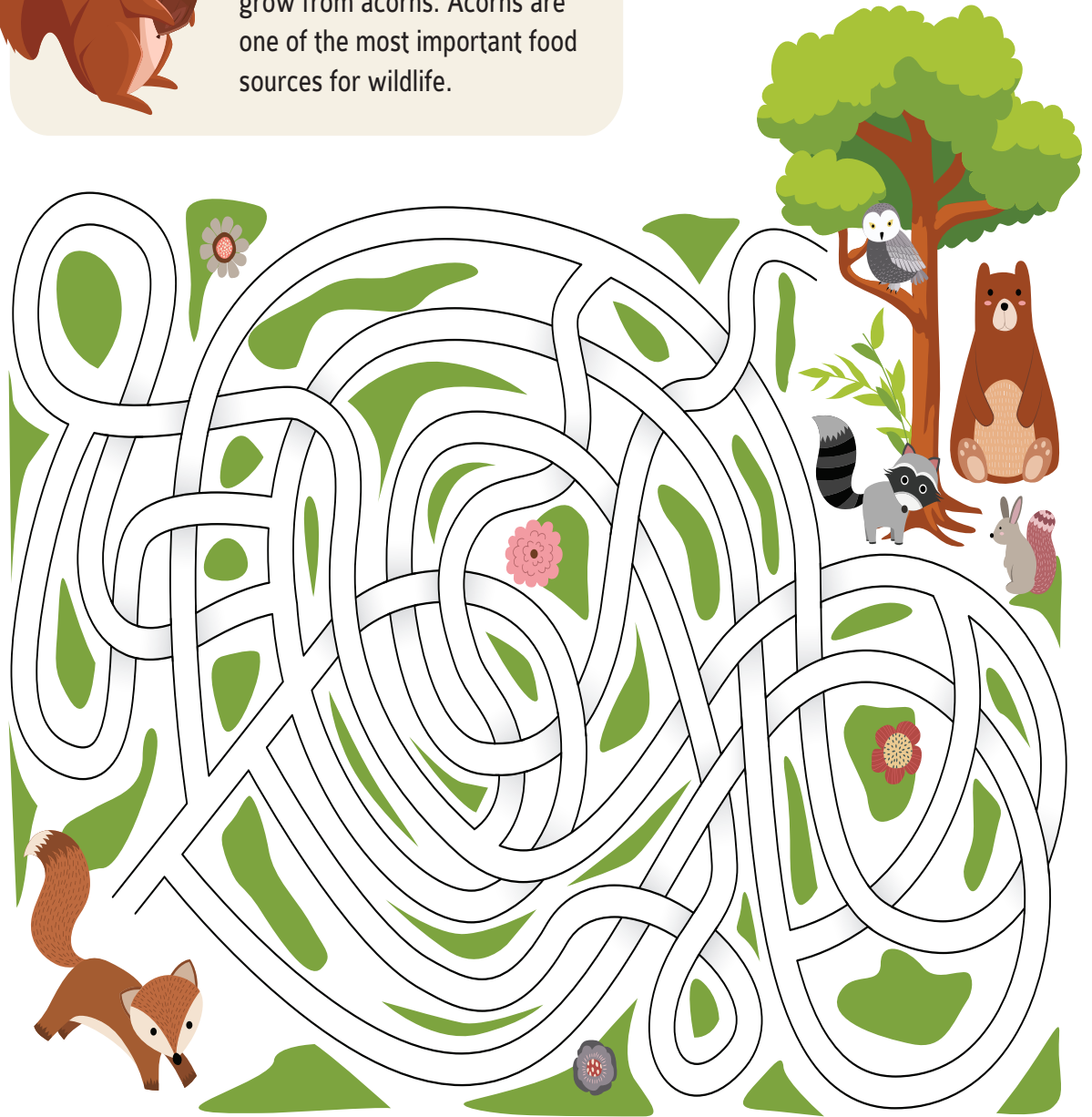
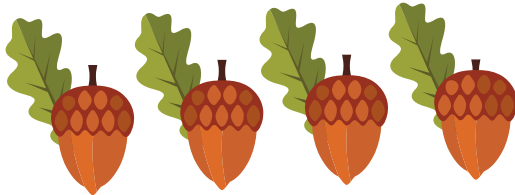


DID YOU KNOW?

CAT FEVER TREATS

INGREDIENTS:

1 Can of tuna (5 ounces, no salt)	2 tbsp flour
2 tbsp olive oil	1 egg
1 mashed banana	

Mix the tuna with olive oil, egg, flour and mashed banana. Flatten onto a parchment lined cookie sheet and bake for 10-15 minutes at 350 degrees, allow to cool, and then cut into kitty-bite sized pieces.
