



Chocolate Cherry Cookies

Butter ½ cup (softened) Granulated sugar 1/3 cup Vanilla 1 tsp Flour 1 cup & 3 tbsp Salt 1/4 tsp Maraschino cherries 3/3 cup (chopped) Dried cherries 1/3 cup

Chocolate chips ½ cup

Brown sugar ¾ cup 1 Egg Cocoa powder 1/3 cup Baking soda 1/2 tsp Cornstarch 1 tsp

Start by preparing the cookie dough: beat butter, brown sugar, and granulated sugar. Add egg and vanilla. Beat in dry ingredients (flour, cocoa powder, baking soda, salt, cornstarch). Stir in maraschino cherries, dried cherries, and chocolate chips or chunks. Scoop the dough into 2-tablespoon balls and bake for 8-10 minutes at 350 F.

The inspiration for this recipe is because one of my Papa's favorite candies was the Queen Anne Cordial Cherries. Which inspired Chocolate Cherry cookies. This recipe is in memory of my papa Tom Evans.
